

Mr. Jacobsen is an attorney and businessman who owns and operates successful businesses in the sports and entertainment industries.

Among Mr. Jacobsen's business investments is the Wilmington Blue Rocks Professional Baseball Club. The Blue Rocks are a single "A" affiliate of the Kansas City Royals who play in a 6,500 seat multi-purpose stadium adjacent to Interstate 95 in Wilmington, Delaware. The Club, a member of the Carolina League, won the League Championship in 1994, 1996, 1998 and 1999 and has advanced to the championship series in other years of the franchise's existence. The performance of the Club – on the field and in the front office – has resulted in numerous national awards for excellence.

Mr. Jacobsen also had interests in the restaurant industry, being the primary investor in Typhoon Brewery at 54th Street and Madison Avenue in New York City, highlighted in Gourmet magazine.

In the movie industry, Mr. Jacobsen was Executive Producer of the film "The Quality of Light" starring Blythe Danner and Frederic Forrest, and Producer of the movie "Good Luck" starring Gregory Hines and Vincent D'Onofrio.

Through his law office and sports marketing company Sports Concepts, Inc., Mr. Jacobsen provides legal advisory and consulting services to professional athletes on promotions, product endorsements, appearances and other marketing activities. Among Mr. Jacobsen's clients is star Philadelphia Eagles Quarterback **Michael Vick** and other present and former notable professional athletes.

Mr. Jacobsen is active in many civic and athletic organizations in his local community.

Mr. Jacobsen founded and managed a small independent record label which recorded Philadelphia area artists of various musical genres in such famed studios as KAJEM Studios in Gladwyn, PA, Studio 4 in Philadelphia, Sigma Sound Studios in Philadelphia and The House of Music in West Orange, NJ., successfully promoting his artists on regional level along the East Coast. He was an active member of the Philadelphia Music Alliance who, working with fellow Board members Larry Magid and other industry heavyweights, established the "Walk of Fame" along the Avenue of the Arts on Broad Street in Philadelphia, honoring musicians with Philadelphia roots such as Hall & Oates, Boyz II Men, and others with national and international fame.

Through his record company, Mr. Jacobsen also was a founding sponsor and active advisor to the Philadelphia Music Conference, an annual assembly of industry executives, producers, promoters, musicians, songwriters and others which held multiple day panel discussions on a wide variety of topics in the music industry, showcased bands at local venues, and featured such keynote speakers as Jonathan Poneman, founder of Sub-Pop Records, and Michael Greene, the National President and CEO of the National Academy of Recording Artists & Sciences (NARAL).

In February 1995, President Clinton appointed Mr. Jacobsen to the President's Advisory

Committee at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. where he was a member of the Executive Committee and head of the Projects Committee, a Presidential Appointment that he held for the next six years.
